Then, have them research engineered solutions for survival for their assigned phenomenon. (For younger students, provide the relevant information.) Have groups present their findings.

REBUILDING AFTER KATRINA

Rebuilding after a storm requires funding. Many people affected by Hurricane Katrina had insurance, grants, and FEMA funding. Still, there were inequities in the relief provided for rebuilding. Before focusing on New Orleans, familiarize students with interactive maps by



searching online for one featuring your town or a nearby city or attraction.
