BEFORE READING

The Cover: Have students make predictions about the story based on the cover.

The Pictures: Take a brief picture walk and ask students what they notice about the family.

Prior Knowledge: Ask students, "What is something you want to do but not old enough yet. How do you feel about it?"

Vocabulary: Frontload Tier 2 words using the accompanying Vocabulary Guide.

Purpose for Reading: "As we read today, look for how Gertie helps her family prepare for the first night of Hanukkah."

DURING READING

Check for understanding & make connections:

- · Explain what happens in the kitchen.
- · Why does Gertie want to make latkes?

AFTER READING

Our Purpose: The family is preparing for the first night of Hanukkah. How did Gertie help with Hanukkah?

Extending Our Thinking: Gertie was upset and felt left out for not being able to help. Using <u>RIF's Influences on a Character</u>, have students give examples of how Gertie felt and why she felt that way.
