

The Snowman's Holiday

READ ALOUD GUIDE

Themes: Creativity, Family, Problem-Solving

Book Brief: A delightful story about two brothers who make a snowman friend and find a creative way to share the magic with their cousins in warm, sunny Australia!

Illustrator: Alena Tkach



BEFORE READING

The Cover: Ask students to make a prediction about the story based on the cover and title.

The Pictures: Take a quick picture walk and ask students what they notice about the illustrations.

Prior Knowledge: Ask, "Have you ever built a snowman? What happens to a snowman when it gets warm?" (Optional: Think-Pair-Share)

Vocabulary: Frontload Tier 2 words using the accompanying <u>Vocabulary Guide</u>.

Purpose for Reading: "As we read, pay attention to the problem the brothers face and how they solve it."



Think Aloud: "I'm noticing that the brothers have a problem—they want to bring their snowman to Australia, but he'll melt in the warm weather!

They solve this by bringing his magical materials instead and making a sandman at the beach. That's creative problem-solving!"

DURING READING

Check for understanding & make connections:

- What do the brothers make at the beginning of the story?
- Where do the brothers want to take their snowman?
- · Why can't they bring the snowman to Australia?
- How do the brothers solve this problem?

AFTER READING

Our Purpose: "What problem did the brothers face? How did they solve it in a creative way?"

Extending Our Thinking: Ask students, "If you could build a snowman or sandman, what special things would you use to decorate it?" Encourage students to draw two pictures side-by-side: one showing a snowman they would build in the winter with labeled decorations (like buttons, carrot nose, scarf), and one showing a sandman they would build at the beach with different materials (like shells, seaweed, sunglasses). Students can share both drawings and explain what materials they would use for each.
