

## Togo and Balto to the Rescue

## READ ALOUD GUIDE

Themes: Courage, Teamwork, Heroism

Book Brief: The incredible true story of Togo and Balto, two brave sled dogs who raced through dangerous conditions to deliver life-saving medicine to a town in need!

## **BEFORE READING**

The Cover: Ask students to make a prediction about the story based on the cover and title.

The Pictures: Take a quick picture walk and ask students what they notice about the illustrations.

Prior Knowledge: Ask, "What does it mean to be a hero? Can animals be heroes too?" (Optional: Think-Pair-Share)

**Vocabulary**: Frontload Tier 2 words using the accompanying <u>Vocabulary Guide</u>.

Purpose for Reading: "As we read, pay attention to what happens in Togo and Balto's journey. Think about what is their problem and how they solve it."

Think Aloud:

• What problem does the town have?

- Why do they need Togo and Balto's help?
- What challenges do the dogs face on their journey?
- How do Togo and Balto help save the town?

Think Aloud: "I'm noticing the connection between events. First, the town has sick people who need medicine. Then, Togo and Balto race through dangerous weather to deliver it. Finally, the medicine arrives and helps save the town. Each event connects to the next!"

## AFTER READING

Our Purpose: "What was Togo and Balto's problem? How did they solve it?"

**Extending Our Thinking:** Ask students, "What makes someone a hero? How did Togo and Balto show bravery?" Encourage students to create a "Hero Certificate" or medal for either Togo or Balto (or both), decorating it with drawings and writing one sentence about why that dog is a hero. Students can share their certificates and explain what heroic action they're celebrating.
