

Before your audience arrives: Hide some objects in your store or library for kids to find during the Super Sleuth activity. These objects can be given as prizes at the end of the party.

- Magnifying glass
- Composition notebook
- Pen
- Flashlight
- Water canteen

As you are setting up the event: Pass out secret notes on pieces of composition notebook paper that say "top-secret spy meeting" and list the location of the party where everyone should go to hear you read aloud.

When the party starts: Read aloud from chapter one of **HARRIET THE SPY** to give an introduction to the character for those who have not yet read the book.

After the read aloud: Conclude your event with the following activities included in this kit:

- Character description writing prompt: Pass around copies of the Super Sleuth activity page and have the kids describe people in the town they imagine.
- For the "Can you find . . . ?" activity, give everyone a checklist of the objects you've hidden around the room and have them go on a treasure hunt.
- Writing activity for "Oh, No!": Pass out the "composition notebook" sheets and have readers answer the writing prompt.
- Invite everyone to enjoy refreshments including Harriet's favorites: tomato sandwiches, and cake and milk!
