### TIME TO READ!



background: Find out what your child knows about the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Explain that not everyone in the US has always had equal rights. \*This book talks about Dr. King's death. Be prepared for any questions. While reading, look at the quotations: The quotes on each page are things Martin Luther King, Jr., actually said. Talk about each one.

#### After reading, ask questions:

- What does "White only" mean?
- Who was Rosa Parks? Why didn't she give up her seat on the bus?
- Why didn't Martin Luther King, Jr., stop after his house was bombed?

## **RELATED ACTIVITIES**

#### STAINED GLASS GELATIN

Ingredients: several boxes of gelatin dessert in different colors, paper plates, plastic knives, cookie cutters (optional)

Make gelatin using the directions on the box. Pour each color into a different pan and chill until firm. When firm, cut gelatin into shapes with plastic knives or cookie cutters. Put the shapes on a paper plate to make a delicious stained glass picture!

#### OUT AND ABOUT

Everyone faces *discrimination* at some point. Ask your child to think about a time they were judged because of the way they look or talk or what they believe. Share your own experiences and talk about how you dealt with them.
